CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Eskridge called the City Council Meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Councilmember Hase gave the invocation. Mayor Eskridge led the audience in the pledge of allegiance. Council roll call indicated a quorum of council members present for the meeting.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES: *November 9, 2009 Regular City Council Meeting Minutes
November 30, 2009 Special Called City Council Meeting Minutes*

Councilmember DeLoughy made a motion to approve the November 9, 2009 regular City Council meeting minutes and November 30, 2009 special called City Council meeting minutes. Councilmember Weaver seconded the motion. Councilmember Bird recommended correcting the November 30th attendance record for Councilmember Hase to either present or absent. Voting was unanimous in favor of the motion.

PRESENTATION:

The City Attorney stated for the record that he represented Mr. Haney previously and on any questions regarding Mr. Haney, he would need to recuse himself.

REQUESTS TO ADDRESS CITY COUNCIL

6. JONATHAN HANEY: *PD Complaint*

Mr. Haney addressed council concerning the Police Department's inadequate response to a recent burglary at Dolphin, the theft of one of his trucks, giving false statements, refusing to perform investigative procedures and code enforcement of signs.

The City Manager responded to the alleged complaints by reading an investigate report, which is attached as part of the minutes. The Mayor and Councilmember's discussed the City Manager finishing the investigation so the issues could be brought to the Public Safety Committee for recommendation.

7. BARBARA RYAN: *Tree Ordinance*

Ms. Ryan read a statement in opposition of the destruction of twelve mature live oaks to make way for the new CVS at the corner of Osborne Road and Spur 40, and requested clarification on the City's stand on this issue. A copy of the statement is attached as part of the minutes.

Alex Kearns

Ms. Kearns read a statement in opposition of the tree destruction and supported a Species/Heritage Tree Ordinance.

The Planning Director stated that he and Mr. Shanahan had discussed the issue with Ms. Ryan and CVS. CVS plan was presented to council for lot line and rezoning changes. A check was received from CVS in the amount of \$6,000 for tree replacement. In accordance with the tree bank ordinance, there is a cost of \$500 per tree or another method could be chosen for alternative compliance that did not include the tree board. The tree ordinance is for public owned trees not private. CVS has complied with all the City requirements and ordinances. Councilmember's discussed ordinance compliance, environmental rights and working with EarthKeepers to update the ordinance.

8. JUANITA CARTER: *Business Address*

Ms. Carter addressed council regarding changing the business address from 261 Professional Circle, Suite B as assigned to Kings Bay Road because of the loss of business due to customers not being able to find the location. Zoning was originally done in Kingsland prior to moving the lines of St. Marys on Professional Circle Road.

The Planning Director stated that the professional park was originally laid out by the developer and Professional Circle remained because the entrance was not on Kings Bay Road. He further stated that he had worked with the post office to identify addresses. The City's data is based on county maps and subdivision drawings. If the address was on a

private Street, something could be done with coordination with the post office. All updates should be made with the direction locators.

9. GARY BLOUNT: *Water/Sewer Rates*

Mr. Blount addressed council regarding the Brant Creek's negotiation of discounts for construction fees on a developer's agreement at 2006 rates; the current ordinance change affecting construction fees by not being paid up front and repayment of the loan; no local contractors, supplies or taxes being paid to the City; no consideration for a traffic light at the complex; and not supplying sewer on Spur 40.

Councilmember Weaver responded that the ordinance does not allow negotiating. Winding River was negotiated for a sewer line down Colerain Rd. on the front end of all the fees. The City paid \$500,000 so the road would not be torn up again. There should be no discounts on sewer for new people coming into the City when sewer is not supplied for our own people on Spur 40.

10. WESLEY ROSE: *Temporary Alcohol License*

Mr. Rose addressed council requesting approval to hold a New Years Eve event on the adjacent lot currently leased as additional parking for the restaurant from 9:00 p.m. to 1:30 a.m. Alcoholic beverages will not be sold on the lot, only consumed. A temporary fence will be constructed to contain those in attendance with an emergency exit in the event of an emergency. Staff will be located at the emergency exit as well numerous other locations in the parking lot to insure that those in attendance remain in the designated area. Overflow parking will be at Sweetwater Park and shuttle service will be provided.

The Mayor and Councilmember's discussed adding the issue to the agenda as Item "Q".

ST. MARYS CERTIFIED GENERAL ELECTION RESULTS (POSTPONED 11/23/09)

Mayor Eskridge stated that the Certified November 3, 2009 General Election Results were the same as advertised in the newspapers, which are attached as part of the minutes. There were no comments.

DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY APPOINTMENTS: (Stafford & Rowland) 11/30/09

Mayor Eskridge stated that letters were submitted by Herbert Rowland and Tom Stafford for reappointment to the Development Authority.

Councilmember Weaver made a motion to approve the reappointments. Councilmember Bird seconded the motion. Voting was unanimous in favor of the motion.

ELECTED OFFICIALS RECOGNITION OF SERVICE: *Mayor Eskridge, Councilmember Johnson and Councilmember Weaver*

Mayor Eskridge recognized Gull Weaver and Larry Johnson for their dedication and service to the City of St. Marys as City Council Members from January 2006 - December 2009.

The City Clerk presented Rowland T. Eskridge, Sr. with a Distinguished Service Award for outstanding and distinguished service in providing a better quality of life for the citizens of St. Marys as Mayor January 1, 2006 – December 31, 2009 and Councilmember January 1, 2002 – December 31, 2005.

APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA

Councilmember Weaver made a motion to approve the agenda, adding Lucky Dawgs under "Q" and moving executive session up before actual business. Councilmember DeLoughy seconded the motion. Mayor Eskridge indicated that executive session would be the first item on the agenda as "AA". Voting was unanimous in favor of the motion.

GRANTING AUDIENCE TO THE PUBLIC:

Cookie Johnson, resident thanked Mayor Eskridge, Councilmember Weaver and Councilmember Johnson for all their time. She also spoke in support of the Downtown Drainage Project because the amount of water that collects on the streets was observed first hand during the Tour of Homes over the weekend.

Rosemary Rillo, resident read a statement regarding the tree destruction on commercial property, changing the ordinance and the importance of trees to our community. A copy of the statement is attached as part of the minutes.

Peggy Hollis, Chairman Citizens Advisory Board spoke on behalf of the Board voting unanimously to recommend saving the live oak as a protected tree.

Larry Bertolini, resident read a letter on behalf of Mary Keating who expressed her concerns about the loss of the trees at the CVS site.

Juanita Carter spoke in support of treasuring the trees and requested the same privileges as downtown for signs because Kings Bay Road businesses were not allowed to have sandwich board signs or beautification in the median.

Roger Rillo, resident spoke in opposition of the Osborne Street sign that is a safety issue for drivers at night and to enforce the tree ordinance instead of finding loopholes.

Dave Schmitz, resident spoke in opposition of the expansion of medians in the downtown area, removal of parallel parking posing a safety hazard and the portable signs at Ops.

Renny Adams, resident expressed concerns that not one of the trees could not be saved at the CVS site.

Gary Blount, resident expressed concerns about the approval of eight waterlines on Brant Creek's permit for a 6 inch master meter for a cost savings of \$300,000, which should have been looked at up front.

The Planning Director responded that they were approved by the Fire Department.

Chris Whitlock, business owner expressed concerns about his temporary sign being illegal when JP's has a portable sign, other businesses advertise with temporary signs, notices are posted on trees and telephone poles. He questioned why those signs were not illegal and enforcement of the ordinance was not in place.

The City Marshal responded that JP's was grandfathered.

Bob Nutter, resident expressed concern about Brant Creek building three story facilities using fill dirt without settling, the amount of discounts received, no support to local services, contractors or supplies and taxes coming back on the property owners.

Councilmember Hase responded that taxes and water/sewer monies were two separate accounts.

Gary Blount, resident expressed concerns about the eight feet of mud not being compacted long enough at the building site on Hwy 40.

Tom Cyphers, resident questioned whether every citizen could go forward to negotiate fees. The City Attorney responded that any legal opinion would be given in executive session.

Jim Burnham, resident stated that Downtown Development Authority discussed putting the median in the downtown area with parallel parking on one side years ago.

The Public Works Director responded that parking would be on the west side of Osborne.

AA. EXECUTIVE SESSION: Legal & Personnel (MOVED)

Councilmember DeLoughy made a motion to adjourn to executive session to discuss legal and personnel. Councilmember Weaver seconded the motion. Voting was unanimous in favor of the motion.

The Mayor and Council adjourned to executive session at 8:20 p.m., returning at 8:44 p.m. with Mayor Eskridge calling the Council meeting back to order.

NEW BUSINESS:

A. HOME RULE CHARTER REVISION: Councilmember Johnson

To draft an ordinance to change the plurality to majority in the City Charter

Councilmember Johnson proposed moving from plurality elections to majority elections. It is addressing future election, which is aimed at giving the bulk of St. Marys a voice in

the final decision. Councilmember Johnson moved to change plurality voting to majority voting. Councilmember Bird seconded the motion.

Councilmember's discussed the differences between majority and plurality voting, holding a public hearing for public input, voting by referendum and changing the election schedule to the State and County's years. The City Attorney stated that it was his understanding the current method is favorable with the US Justice Department to protect the rights of minorities. Any changes would need to be approved by the Justice Department.

Councilmember Hase amended the motion to hold a special public hearing in January for discussion and input on whether the public wants a referendum to change the City's method of voting. Councilmember Johnson seconded the motion and withdrew the original motion. Councilmember Bird seconded the withdrawal of the original motion.

Councilmember Hase moved that the city hold a public hearing for the sole purpose, in January, for public input on whether or not to change the charter to reflect the voting process on the majority versus plurality vote as well as getting public input on whether or not to changed the charter on the years of the elections so they would be in sync with the federal and state governments. Voting was unanimous in favor of the motion.

Councilmember Hase moved to add it to the next agenda to establish the date for the public hearing. Councilmember Johnson seconded the motion. Voting was unanimous in favor of the motion.

Councilmember Weaver made a motion to approve the 2011 CIP for FAA/DOT Funding Application. Councilmember DeLoughy seconded the motion.

Councilmember Bird questioned whether the City providing \$175,000 was in conflict of the resolutions and requested the attorney's opinion. The City Attorney responded that he would need to review the documents before providing a legal opinion. Councilmember's discussed the city portion being in kind contributions; revising the contribution; the impact to drainage when the lake is filled at the new site; non-receipt of a deed from Sea Island; who would move the utility lines and why there were two CIP's.

The City Manager responded that the government would move the lines and the FAA requested combining the CIP's for maintenance of the airport and the engineers into one package. Voting was recorded as follows:

Councilmember Weaver made a motion to award the contract to Petticoat-Schmitt Civil Contractors, Inc. Councilmember Hase seconded the motion. Voting was unanimous in favor of the motion.

I. PAVEMENT RESURFACING PROJECT 2009:

Councilmember Weaver made a motion to award the contract to Dixie Roadbuilders, Inc. and to add the other list of streets. Councilmember Hase seconded the motion. Voting was unanimous in favor of the motion.

Councilmember Weaver stated that new council should work on providing commercial recycling to the businesses, which would lower tipping fees. Councilmember Hase stated that businesses could recycle but there would be an extra charge to recycle.

Councilmember Hase made a motion to authorize the City Manager to look into commercial recycling. Councilmember Johnson seconded the motion. Voting was unanimous in favor of the motion.

Councilmember Weaver stated that the wrong legislation was approved by the Governor and the only change made was to the number of appointments to the CVB Board.

To support legislation encouraging the integration of housing, transportation, energy and environmental planning

Councilmember Johnson made a motion to send a letter of support. Councilmember DeLoughy seconded the motion. ~~Voting was unanimous in favor of the motion.~~

Councilmember Hase stated that there was not enough information, and regional partnership was middle government bureaucracy.

Councilmember Bird amended the motion to postpone for six months. Councilmember Trader seconded the motion. Voting was unanimous in favor of the motion.

P. Camden County Board of Registrars: Statement of Services

To approve unexpected expenses for election services with funding from contingency

Councilmember Bird questioned whether the statement was for 19 years worth of charges. The City Manager responded that it was for only one year but next year the cost will be \$6,000. REPORT OF AUTHORITIES, BOARDS, COMMISSIONS & COMMITTEES:

A. PLANNING DIRECTOR'S REPORT

- 1. SUBDIVISION - MAJOR:** Bay City Construction, Inc., P.O. Box 1107, St. Marys, Georgia, as represented by Privett & Associates, for final Plat approval for a major 15 lot subdivision known as Goering Plantation located on Mickler Road adjacent to the St. Marys Railroad and Mary Lee Clark Elementary School. The property is zoned PD R-1, Tax Parcel 134-012.

Councilmember Weaver made a motion to approve Bay City Construction, Inc. final plat. Councilmember Hase seconded the motion. Councilmember Weaver requested the addition of sidewalks as originally platted.

Councilmember Bird amended the motion to include sidewalks on Mickler Drive. Councilmember Weaver seconded the amended motion. Voting was unanimous in favor of the motion.

2. **SPECIAL USE PERMIT:** Bobbie Sant, 107 Plum Orchard Place, St Marys is requesting a Special Use Permit to operate used car sales at 319 Charlie Smith Sr. Highway. The property is zones C-2, Tax Parcel 135F-018.

Councilmember Hase made a motion to approve the Special Use Permit. Councilmember Bird seconded the motion. Voting was unanimous in favor of the motion.

3. **REZONING:** Rocky Espenshied, 296-B Charlie Smith Sr. Highway, St Marys, requests to rezone Parcels #S29-06-007 & S29-06-013, located on Seagrove St., Gallop St., Patrick St. & Wheeler St., from the present zoning of R2 & R3 to I-L.

Councilmember Weaver made a motion to approve rezoning with the condition that it could only be used for storage. Councilmember Bird seconded the motion. Voting was unanimous in favor of the motion.

B. PERSONNEL COMMITTEE REPORT

2. Excess Leave Policy

Councilmember Hase reported that consensus from the Committee was to approve the four step process but legal verbiage is in question.

Councilmember Hase made a motion to postpone to the January 11th meeting. Councilmember Bird seconded the motion. Voting was unanimous in favor of the motion.

C. PROPERTY COMMITTEE REPORT

2. Portable Classroom Units

Complaints:

The Police Department is not doing its job. I am not sure what he means by this, so will have to wait until the Council meeting to respond.

Officer Goon wrote a statement falsifying info.

- a. Burglary at Dolphin Police refuse to fingerprint or make sure all was secured. Left employee there alone. Did not secure house next door. Would not take owners into consideration.

Employee told officers what was taken that he knew. Officer wanted to check with John even after owner told them she knew what was there.

- a. Ans: Officer met by the Complaint, Mr. Charles Travis Rosell III, (11/27/09) who did not have a key to the facility, who stated that someone had broken one of the side windows. (Picture available to show location, height, and damage to the window.) Mr. Rosell stated that he did not see anyone around the building when he drove up and that the alarm system had been de-activated a couple of months ago. Mr. Rosell stated that he would contact the owner on Monday, Nov 30, 2009, to see if the surveillance cameras are working and notify the St. Marys police department if they saw anyone or anything suspicious. Mr. Rosell stated that he did not think anything was taken and would be securing the window with plywood. (Pictures show the window to be several feet off the ground with glass still in the window frame. So, the only way an individual could have entered the building, through that window, would have been a running dive through the hole in the glass.) Therefore, this was filed as a broken window report. In addition, the City of St. Marys police department was asked to remain at the building until an employee could drive to Lowes to get a piece of plywood to cover the window. We had to let them know that we could not do that as our officers are needed on patrol. This was then filed as a broken window incident, which was correct, and Mr. Haney reported the incident to the Sheriff's Department.
- b. Mr. Haney stated that the City of St. Marys his employee took a truck to Miami without his permission. In addition, Mr. Haney stated that this employee stole tools and the go jacks from the truck. When he tried to press charges, he stated that the City of St Marys Police Department refused to press charges and called him a liar.
 - a. After investigating the complaint, we found that the complaint did not meet the basic statute elements for the commission of a crime falling into the statutes involving theft by taking/theft by deception/and theft by conversion for the following reasons:
 - i. The employee was authorized to drive to Florida by Mr. Haney. (Written statement by Mr. Haney saying so.)
 - ii. There was no specific time frame establish for the use and return of the vehicle in question.
 - iii. There was no evidence to show the employee had intentionally maintained possession of the vehicle in question to deprive the owner of the property.
 - iv. The company administrative assistant had contact with the employee on 02/05/2009 about the use of the wrecker and at that time the employee was alleged to be in Jacksonville, Fl.
 - v. The employee's cellular phone service was out of service when the company representative attempted a second telephone contact on 02/05/2009.
 - vi. The St. Marys Police department not having the required evidence to secure an arrest warrant followed protocol and had an All Point Bulletin disseminated in an attempt to locate the truck.
 - vii. The St. Marys Police department contacted the employee and arranged for the truck to be returned within a specified time frame. (0900, 02/08/2009)

- viii. The wrecker was returned by employee to the Camden County Sheriff's Office Substation.
 - ix. On 02/07/2009, the St. Marys Police Department conducted a telephone interview with the employee in reference to threats made to him by Mr. Haney via telephone.
 - 1. The employee alleged Mr. Heaney stated to him that he would have some of his police buddies waiting on him to set him straight and that when the vehicle was returned he would tell police that several items were missing, so a warrant could be made for his arrest.
 - 2. On 02/07/2009, Mr. Heaney stated that, when he got the vehicle back, that there were several items missing. (tool box, jump box, and two vehicle jacks.)
 - 3. Mr. Heaney was informed of the telephone conversation between the St. Marys Police Department and the employee and briefed that if he gave a false statement that he could be criminally liable.
 - 4. Mr. Haney's statement, 02/07/2009, did not contain any allegations of the property theft. He only wanted the employee prosecuted for stealing this truck, which he had already been briefed could not be done.
 - 5. Mr. Heaney did brief the St. Marys Police Department that he could provide video evidence to show the items he stated were missing were, in fact, on the truck. Mr. Heaney was briefed that if he could provide this information, then we could seek criminal prosecution for the theft of the items. To this date we have not received the video as promised.
 - x. In conclusion, there is not sufficient evidence to establish the elements of the crime of theft by taking and to support a criminal prosecution, the case was closed.
- c. Mr. Haney stated that when he tried to repossess a vehicle, at his business location, from a customer who was several payments behind, the customer tried to steal the vehicle and in the process damaged two vehicles. He tried to press charges and the police would not file charges.
- a. After investigating the complaint, we found that the complaint did not meet the basic statute elements for the commission of a crime falling into the statutes involving theft by taking/theft by deception/and theft by conversion for the following reasons:
 - i. The owner had lawful possession of the vehicle through a written contract.
 - ii. Mr. Heaney could not produce a, "Writ of Possession issued through the Camden county magistrate Court authorizing the repossession of the property lawfully in the possession of the customer at the time.
 - iii. The owner was assaulted at the time Mr. Heaney and Mr. Ardolino took it upon themselves to attempt a forcible repossession of the vehicle. (On video and seen by the Asst. Police Chief, Major Wooten.)
 - iv. The vehicle sitting on the sales lot was damaged as a direct result of Mr. Haney's and Mr. Ardolino's actions during the forcible repossession.

- v. Mr. Heaney and Mr. Ardolino sustained personal injury as a direct result of their own unlawful actions to forcibly repossess property without court authority.
- b. Upon review of the above it was found that :
 - i. Mr. Heaney attempted to use trickery to lure the customer to the business to affect repossession, as he believed if the vehicle was on his property that he had a right to do this.
 - ii. The customer went to the business in good faith believing she could make some kind of payment on the vehicle until she could pay the balance.
 - iii. The customer became scared and attempted to leave the business so she would not lose her car.
 - iv. The customer was in lawful possession of the car at the time of the incident, as no court order existed authorizing and/or ordering the vehicle to be repossessed for cause.
 - v. Mr. Ardolino could be found liable under the criminal code for simple battery as the customer was struck by him when he forcibly entered the vehicle while it was in motion.
 - vi. Mr. Heaney could be found liable for Party to a Crime as he directed Mr. Ardolino to affect the repossession and assisted in trying to conduct the repossession.
- c. Mr. Heaney has conducted this type business in the past and has had complaints filed as a result, but the victim did not desire to prosecute him.
- d. Mr. Heaney has been warned, in the past, about this type of action and has been given the information on how to lawfully repossess property in the state of Georgia.
- e. The customer did not want to pursue criminal charges against anyone as a result of the incident.
- f. There not being sufficient evidence to establish the elements of the crime of theft by taking and to support a criminal prosecution, the case was closed.
- d. Mr. Heaney stated that Major Wooten stated that he should have repossessed the vehicle at the customer's residence, at night, instead of his place of business. THIS DID NOT HAPPEN, Major Wooten denies it and there are no witnesses to say otherwise. Major Wooten has worked his way up from Patrolperson to Asst. Police Chief and over the last, almost, six years, I have had no reason to ever doubt his word.

Based on the information provided, I can find no evidence, at all, to show that Mr. Heaney was ever treated unfairly or unprofessionally. In addition, I can find no evidence to show that the St. Marys Police Department did anything other than their duty when responding to Mr. Heaney's complaints.

They say a picture is worth a thousand words, so I'd like to share this picture I have with Mayor, Council, City Staff, and audience. It speaks for itself.

Last week, 12 of St. Marys' longest-standing citizens were destroyed. Twelve mature live oaks, our state tree and long-time symbol of St. Marys—the live oak is even on our city seal. These twelve majestic oaks were destroyed to make way for the new CVS at the corner of Osborne Road and Spur 40.

Few people seemed to have been aware that ALL the trees on that site were to be destroyed. Nearly 17,000 cars pass that spot everyday, that's more than 25,000 people EVERY day—it's one of our city's gateways coming from the base . Many of these people, like myself, took a double-take and felt sucker punched to discover such devastation without warning.

We're here tonight to try and clarify what the City of St. Marys' standing is on trees like the live oak that should be considered our heritage tree. Did anyone measure the trees so that we would know collectively exactly what we've lost? Was it a thousand years of history? Two thousand years? That's our first question. We have more.

We all wish to support diverse development and economic health. Increasingly, however, it is being proven that ill-advised construction or land-clearing is detrimental to the environmental, social, economic and future of growing cities and towns. Land value plummets, the aesthetics are irreparably compromised and citizens' sense of pride is eroded.

The citizens ask - how was the loss of these 12 oaks allowed to happen? Clearly there are questions that need to be answered:

- 1) Why would any public official not wish to uphold the clear spirit and intent of the Tree ordinances (the ordinances repeatedly state that the **Tree Board** must be involved)?
- 2) Why was there a breakdown in communication to the point where the Mayor and some council members were unaware that **all** trees would be destroyed?
- 3) Why were arrangements for the full replacement of these trees not discussed until **after** the permits were granted (as per of City Ordinance 102-28, 3 and 102-29, C among others)?
- 4) Will the City adopt a **Species/Heritage Tree Ordinance** (similar to those that are being embraced by most other communities with "trees of note") so that we might avoid this kind of debacle in the future?

From Guidelines for Developing and Evaluating Tree ordinances – University of Georgia:
“**Species** - Special status may be conferred to certain species of trees. Special status trees are often, but not always, important locally native species or trees that are associated with **the character of a community.**”

Live oaks are, indeed, associated with “**the character of our community**”. They are not only our state tree, but St. Marys' own City symbol.

**“Dear Alex,
Your City Council should most certainly pass a Tree Protection Order that would ban cutting Species or Heritage Trees.
Often people who are relocating will write to us and want to know which cities are Tree City USA members because they think that if a city doesn't care about trees then the schools, parks, streets, etc. probably aren't cared for, either.”**

We, as a community, must decide what defines and enriches us: socially, environmentally and economically. There is little use in attempting to attract new residents and business if we lose that which makes our city an appealing location. Trees are the heart of St. Marys – and there is no heart transplant possible once our symbol of history and beauty is lost to us.

I respectfully request that Council consider the inclusion of Species or Heritage Tree protection in our City ordinances

I don't know what the ordinances said concerning trees prior to the current ordinance. However, over the last several years I have seen:

- Every last tree removed from the lot where Fuji's restaurant currently operates; it was originally cleared to build a Dairy Queen, along with the adjacent lot, which has remained vacant and barren ever since. When DQ was built, a small building, it was surrounded by an enormous amount of asphalt for parking, and no landscaping. On its best day, then or now, I have never seen that parking lot even close to full
- Marsh Arbors tore out trees that were supposedly part of a public park along Dilworth St., in front of what was once the local hospital. That property remains an eyesore
- I can't think of any structure on Kings Bay Road that didn't wipe the entire area clean of vegetation before construction – hospital, Wal-Mart, Aunt B's strip center, Atrium Villas and property between Atrium & Aunt B's, anything else on that road.
- St. Marys Middle School, ugly as sin in its own right, has nary a tree around it, save for a few sad, lonely looking palms surrounded mostly by weeds. Though it hadn't many trees before, at least there had been a few.
- Some kind of condo development at the intersection of St. Marys & Colerain Roads has a few trees remaining along its border with St. Marys road, but the rest of the property is now just a mud pit that can't sell anything in the current market
- Pet Supplies Plus – nekkid as a J-bird. They didn't even plant a token twig outside.
- O'Reilly's Auto Parts – ditto.
- KFC – well at least they landscaped and planted a few twigs, but no original large trees remain there.
- A lot stripped clear on Osborne Rd. and a "for sale" sign erected on it
- The new apartment complex under construction on Hwy. 40; nary a tree in sight amid the raft of huge structures
- And finally, the most recent and among the most egregious, having only just taken place, and this under the "new ordinance," the CVS new store location.

I understand there is to be a new Dollar Store, or something of that ilk, at the intersection of Osborne and Julia Streets. I don't know what the plans call for, but if other projects in this town are any sort of gauge, it'll be stripped bare. It'll probably have a boxy, featureless building constructed and be finished off with yards of asphalt and a horrendously ugly sign.

Trees are important for a variety of reasons:

- They make St. Marys attractive and desirable
- They improve property value
- They provide the oxygen needed by all people and creatures to live

- They provide habitat to a variety of animals, some of which help control pests (like bats and birds)
- They secure the soil, helping to prevent erosion and flooding, a very important function in our area.
- The Live Oak is on our City Seal (even though some wanted to change it) and is the State tree
- The City receives benefits from its designation as a “Tree City”

If current trends, and disregard on the part of our City officials continue, we will become a tree-less City with little appeal, lower property values, lost income and greater propensity for land erosion and flooding. Special features can be appreciated in a desert, but none of those will be present here either.
